Text: Acts 8:26-40

Theme: ACTS-ION:

**The Dynamic Life of Christ's Church –
Then and Now**

SUMMARY OF "SERMON": The conversion of the Ethiopian eunuch is a remarkable story illustrating the Holy Spirit's guiding a believer in what might be called "a divine appointment".

A divine appointment is Spirit-led, reflects that a believer is open to how the Lord wants to use him/her, involves listening to both the Holy Spirit as well as those in the situation, and is part of God's bigger plan of using His people to draw others to faith in Christ.

RELATED BIBLE PASSAGES FOR THE COMING WEEK [The Bible readings this week involve learning to listen to the Holy Spirit and following God into divine appointments.]

*Monday, Apr. 3 – **Acts 9:10-19*** [Ananias is given a hard assignment – go and pray for Saul. Ananias knew Saul's reputation as a persecutor of Christians and needed to trust the Lord that Saul's conversion was not a trap. But Ananias obeyed the Lord (who spoke by the Holy Spirit) and the divine encounter empowered Saul with the Holy Spirit.]

*Tuesday, Apr. 4 – **Genesis 24*** [This charming story of how Abraham's servant was led to find Rebecca, Isaac's wife, is a great example of how the Lord answers prayer through divine encounters. Although the Holy Spirit is not directly mentioned it is obvious that He is at work behind the scenes.]

*Wednesday, Apr. 5 – **Acts 10:1-23*** [We see here how the Holy Spirit was working both sides of the equation to bring Peter to the divine encounter with a Gentile, Cornelius, who was seeking the true God and found salvation in Christ. Note the Spirit's work through both the vision to Peter as well as the direct command, vv.19-20.]

*Thursday, Apr. 6 – **1 Samuel 3:1-18*** [The story of Samuel being called of God is a good example that we need to learn to discern the Spirit's voice. In the process we may make mistakes but, like Samuel, we will grow in recognizing the Spirit's nudges and promptings.]

*Friday, Apr. 7 – **Revelation 2:18-29*** [Each of the seven letters to the churches in Revelation 2-3 ends with the call to 'hear what the Spirit says to the Churches.' In this letter to Thyatira, the Spirit speaks both warning to those in heresy and encouragement to those standing firm.]

*Saturday, Apr. 8 – **Acts 13:1-4*** [A group of Christian leaders were worshipping in Antioch when the Holy Spirit spoke to them to set aside Saul and Barnabas for a missions journey. This launch of the missions movement began the spread of the gospel to the nations.]



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SUGGESTIONS FOR PRAYER FOR THE “LORD’S WATCH”

The “**Lord’s Watch**” is a growing commitment of South King County churches to pray together for revival, reconciliation, reformation, and reaching the lost. Participating churches choose a particular day each month to pray. Following is a loose outline to provide cohesiveness for each of us in praying the Lord’s Watch.

I. Rejoice/Adoration

[Use an appropriate scripture: e.g. Psalm 100, Ephesians 1:15-23]

II. Repentance/Confession

[Psalm 139:23-24, Isaiah 59:1-2]

III. Revival in the Church

[e.g. Psalm 85:6-9]

FIPC, Tukwila area churches, South King County, Seattle region

IV. Reconciliation

[e.g. II Corinthians 5:16-21]

Pray for unity between churches, and between Christians at work, in neighborhoods, schools, families, etc.

V. Reformation in Society

Pray for the infusion of God’s righteousness and justice to address the issues of crime, drugs, immorality, poverty, materialism, loss of sanctity of life, etc.

VI. Reaching the Lost

Pray for an awakening among those without Christ, including all ages, and all ethnic groups. Pray for a desire to seek Him who is “the way, the truth, and the life.” [John 14:6]

VII. Reflect

[Psalm 111:2] Think of the mighty works of God and of His promises to you, our congregation, the churches of South King County, and to our society. Let’s all freshly yield ourselves to seek God’s kingdom and His righteousness.

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
