Text: *John 13:34-35*

**SUMMARY OF SERMON:** When Jesus washed the disciples' feet He was demonstrating the full extent of His love (John 13:1). In essence, He was pointing to His soon crucifixion, showing that as the Father's humble Servant He would bring the cleansing (from sin) they needed. In our text, He gives the command to all His followers to have this same heart of sacrificial love. This would be a witness to others that we belong to Jesus.

**RELATED BIBLE PASSAGES FOR THE COMING WEEK** [The Bible readings this week reveal the importance of loving others with the love of the Lord.]

*Monday, Nov. 7 – **I Corinthians 13*** [Any discussion of understanding the biblical nature of the love in Christ that we are to share with others must include this classic chapter. In reality, the nature of the love expressed here is impossible for us to meet with perfection. But the Holy Spirit can certainly move our hearts in this direction and make our love real.]

*Tuesday, Nov. 8 – **Philippians 1:1-11*** [As Paul opens this letter with greetings and thanksgiving he offers a prayer (vv.9-11) that includes the desire that God would increase the Philippians love in depth and understanding.]

*Wednesday, Nov. 9 – **Leviticus 19*** [This chapter includes regulations related to Israel's laws of holiness. Of significance is the phrase, "love your neighbor as yourself," (v.18) which came to be seen as a summary of God's law in how we relate to others and also the command (v.34) to love the non-natives in our midst.]

*Thursday, Nov. 10 – **Mark 10:17-27*** [Jesus' interaction with the rich young man was filled with love (v.21). The fact that Jesus needed to challenge the man is sound evidence that loving others does not mean having to agree with everything about them or ignoring things that might be harmful to them.]

*Friday, Nov. 11 – **I Thessalonians 3:11-4:10*** [Note the wonderful blessing Paul proclaims in 3:12 about living a life of love. Later, in 4:9-10 he revisits the theme of loving others.]

*Saturday, Nov. 12 – **I John 3:11-24*** [The apostle John, who wrote this letter, is sometimes known as the apostle of love because of his emphasis on Jesus' command that we are to love one another. This passage is one clear example of this emphasis.]
