**Texts: *Rom. 12:4-8; I Cor. 12:1-11***  
**SPRING 2016 SERIES:**  
**The Christian and Spiritual Gifts**

**SUMMARY OF SERMON:** Paul writes in both Romans 12 and in I Corinthians 12 about spiritual gifts and their place in the body of Christ. The gift list in Romans is of “motivational” gifts (hard-wired into our personalities from birth) while the gift list in I Corinthians is of “manifestational” gifts (Spirit-inspired in a particular setting for a particular purpose.) The former is like computer hardware and the latter like computer software.

**RELATED BIBLE PASSAGES FOR THE COMING WEEK** [The Bible readings this week give further insight into the use of spiritual gifts.]

*Monday, April 4 – **Ephesians 4:7-16*** [Paul speaks of Christ giving “gifts” to the church (vv.7-8). What becomes clear in vv.11-12 is that in this case the “gifts” are people in leadership to help equip the whole body of Christ for ministry.]

*Tuesday, April 5 - **I Peter 4:8-11*** [Peter speaks of spiritual gifts as well. Of particular note is that Peter implies in v.10 that *all* Christians are gifted in some way and also, v.11, that the ultimate purpose of faithfully exercising our spiritual gifts is to bring glory to God through Jesus Christ.]

*Wednesday, April 6 – **I Timothy 4:11-16*** [Timothy was a gifted young leader of the church whom Paul had disciple. Paul encourages Timothy here not to be intimidated by his youthfulness or to neglect (v.14) his spiritual giftedness.]

*Thursday, April 7 – **I Corinthians 13*** [In the midst of an extensive discussion of spiritual gifts in chapters 12-14, Paul emphasizes that love must undergird all that we do for the Lord, including our use of spiritual gifts.]

*Friday, April 8 - **I Corinthians 12:14-27*** [One of the problems in churches like Corinth that Paul addresses is the danger of elevating some gifts over others. In this passage Paul makes clear that *all* spiritual gifts, however insignificant they may seem, are very important to the overall health of the body of Christ.]

*Saturday, April 9 – **James 2:1-13*** [In these two passages we see that although the Corinthians were well equipped with spiritual gifts (1:7) they were still spiritually immature (3:1-3). It is a sobering reminder that while we are to seek spiritual gifts (I Cor. 14:1) without love (see Thursday’s reading) they lose effectiveness.]



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# SUGGESTIONS FOR PRAYER FOR THE “LORD’S WATCH”

Tuesday, April 5, 2016

The “**Lord’s Watch**” is a growing commitment of South King County churches to pray together for revival, reconciliation, reformation, and reaching the lost. Participating churches choose a particular day each month to pray. Following is a loose outline to provide cohesiveness for each of us in praying the Lord’s Watch.

## **I. Rejoice/Adoration**

[Use an appropriate scripture: e.g. Psalm 100, Ephesians 1:15-23]

## **II. Repentance/Confession**

[Psalm 139:23-24, Isaiah 59:1-2]

## **III. Revival in the Church**

[e.g. Psalm 85:6-9]

## **IV. Reconciliation**

[e.g. II Corinthians 5:16-21]

Pray for unity between churches, and between Christians at work, in neighborhoods, schools, families, etc.

## **V. Reformation in Society**

Pray for the infusion of God’s righteousness and justice to address the issues of crime, drugs, immorality, poverty, materialism, loss of sanctity of life, etc.

## **VI. Reaching the Lost**

Pray for an awakening among those without Christ, including all ages, and all ethnic groups. Pray for a desire to seek Him who is “the way, the truth, and the life.” [John 14:6]

## **VII. Reflect**

[Psalm 111:2] Think of the mighty works of God and of His promises to you, our congregation, the churches of South King County, and to our society. Let’s all freshly yield ourselves to seek God’s kingdom and His righteousness.

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
