Texts: Acts 18:24-28
SPRING 2016 SERIES:
The Christian and Spiritual Gifts

SUMMARY OF SERMON: Apollos was a classic teacher. It is likely that Priscilla and Aquila also had the motivational gift of teacher. The latter couple recognized Apollos' great potential in proclaiming the gospel but also saw that his theology was deficient in some way. So they graciously took him into their home and he came out more equipped to persuade people to put their faith in Jesus Christ.

RELATED BIBLE PASSAGES FOR THE COMING WEEK [The Bible readings this week highlight some teachers and teacher characteristics.]

Monday, May 2 – **Matthew 7:24-29** [Jesus finished His famous "Sermon on the Mount" with the story of the houses built on different foundations. These represented whether people who heard His Word trusted Him and obeyed. Note that at the end the people recognized that He taught with divine authority.]

Tuesday, May 3 – **Ezra 7:1-10** [Ezra the priest served Israel in the period right after the Babylonian exile. As the initial Jewish settlers returned to Jerusalem Ezra displayed his passion to teach them the ways of the Lord. Ezra was well qualified, being devoted to the study of God's word.]

Wednesday, May 4 – **I Corinthians 3:1-11** [After being helped by Priscilla and Aquila, Apollos went to Corinth where he strengthened the church. Unfortunately, some Christians there developed a party spirit, trying to identify with Paul, or Apollos, or Peter. This was not the fault of the teachers, who all pointed to Christ. It instead revealed the danger of church members identifying with a human agent rather than Christ.]

Thursday, May 5 – **Psalms 1** [Someone with the motivational gift of teaching would recommend this psalm very highly because it commends the practice of meditating (reflecting on, digging deep into) God's word.]

Friday, May 6 – **Mark 4:21-34** [As a teacher, Jesus taught many concepts of the kingdom of God using parables. This form of teaching would allow Him to explain spiritual concepts in familiar physical terms and also serve as an inducement to seek Him for more insight.]

Saturday, May 7 – **Psalms 19** [A teacher would also like this psalm with its strong emphasis on the beauty and value of God's word. Note the different terms used to express God's word, a practice which reaches its height in Psalm 119.]



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SUGGESTIONS FOR PRAYER FOR THE “LORD’S WATCH”

Tuesday, May 3, 2016

The “**Lord’s Watch**” is a growing commitment of South King County churches to pray together for revival, reconciliation, reformation, and reaching the lost. Participating churches choose a particular day each month to pray. Following is a loose outline to provide cohesiveness for each of us in praying the Lord’s Watch.

I. Rejoice/Adoration

[Use an appropriate scripture: e.g. Psalm 100, Ephesians 1:15-23]

II. Repentance/Confession

[Psalm 139:23-24, Isaiah 59:1-2]

III. Revival in the Church

[e.g. Psalm 85:6-9]

IV. Reconciliation

[e.g. II Corinthians 5:16-21]

Pray for unity between churches, and between Christians at work, in neighborhoods, schools, families, etc.

V. Reformation in Society

Pray for the infusion of God’s righteousness and justice to address the issues of crime, drugs, immorality, poverty, materialism, loss of sanctity of life, etc.

VI. Reaching the Lost

Pray for an awakening among those without Christ, including all ages, and all ethnic groups. Pray for a desire to seek Him who is “the way, the truth, and the life.” [John 14:6]

VII. Reflect

[Psalm 111:2] Think of the mighty works of God and of His promises to you, our congregation, the churches of South King County, and to our society. Let’s all freshly yield ourselves to seek God’s kingdom and His righteousness.

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
